

Larger Than Life

Chuck White was unlike any basketball coach in Alaska's history.

Never mind the record 921 games he won and the 18 state championships he captured in 45 years of high school coaching. White had a polarizing personality that made him larger than life.

Whether you loved him or hated him, White kept hoops relevant in The Last Frontier.

He was front-page news. His signature up-tempo style at both East High and West High in

Anchorage ran opponents ragged and struck such fear that his teams often won games before even taking the court. His exciting brand of ball took the state by storm as his program became a breeding ground for the college ranks.

White produced household names like Trajan Langdon, Muff Butler, Tony Reed, Andre Laws, Ramon Harris, Devon Bookert and Mao Tosi, and dozens more all-state players who now are businessmen, lawyers and doctors.



White left an indelible mark on Alaska before he passed away in 2019. He was 78.

"He was a father figure to me," said former West coach Antonio Wyche, who played for White at East.

"He was a great mentor. He's probably the reason why I started coaching. He gave me my first job."

White also gave Wyche his first loss as a head coach. White did that to a lot of guys.

"The basketball part is how people perceive him, but if you take him away from the court, he was actually a really nice man to be around," Wyche said. "All of his players loved him. People that went against him hated him."

White set a standard for winning and helped Alaska receive unprecedented exposure in the early 1990s, when his East teams were nationally ranked. His teams routinely beat Lower 48 competition, like the time his T-birds bagged Alaska's first championship in the 1992 Alaska Airlines Classic.

White racked up a career .802 winning percentage (921–228) and won 20 games or more in 29 seasons. Twice he won 28 games in a season.


White, a 6-foot-4 man with broad shoulders and an easy smile, was an all-star athlete during his playing days at the University of Idaho. He briefly played minor-league baseball and was drafted to play professional basketball and football.

But he found his niche in coaching.

In 2010, at age 68, White left Alaska for an assistant coaching position at Adams State College in Colorado. There he reunited with one of his former point guards, head coach Louis Wilson, and the pair coached the Grizzlies together until 2015.

White was inducted into the Alaska Sports Hall of Fame in 2011 and inducted into the ASAA High School Hall of Fame in 2013.



Nanalook was also named first-team all-state for the second straight year. She was named second-team all-state as a sophomore.

Barthelman said Nanalook is a big part of Newhalen's 5-out motion offense.

"Everyone's kind of a guard. We don't post up or anything," Barthelman said. "We get out and run guite a bit, being a shorter team."

And Nanalook is a finisher, the head coach said. "She's an incredible scorer," Barthelman said. "Great shooter with many ways to score too. She's an excellent three-point shooter, and she takes it to the hole hard with authority"

Nanalook averaged about 25 points a game during the regular season. She led 1A girls in scoring among the teams to report their statistics on Max Preps.

But there is more to her game, Bethelman said.

"It's not just scoring," Bethelman said. "This year and last year she's really picked it up defensively." Nanalook was responsible for key defensive matchups.

"She was our tallest player this year. We had her guarding some much bigger girls. She did a nice job with that too. She's an all-around good player."

Nanalook's teammate, Aileen Lester, was also named to the first team. Lester was the 1A girls player of the year last year.

As a freshman, Gregory hit a game-tying three-pointer in a state tournament game to force overtime.

"Brenden is very much a clutch player," Trombley said. "He's a competitor. He's one of the most competitive kids I've ever seen. He's very confident in his abilities. On top of that, he's a really good kid. He's an absolute joy to coach."

Overall, Gregory scored more than 1,800 total points in his career. He averaged 23 points per game as a senior.





Gregory also played football for Dimond High School white attending Lumen, as part of ASAA's co-op program. He started at guarterback for his final two seasons.

Gregory is one of two Lumen players on the first team, along with fellow senior Tim Bennett.

"(Brenden) and Tim hold special spots. They've been around for five years. We've had a lot of success together with this program," Trombley said.

Last year Ninilchik standout Landon Colburn was named the top player in the 1A boys class. During the offseason, Ninilchik was bumped to 2A.

Different level, same result.

Colburn has been named the Wasilla Physical Therapy/Alaska Association of Basketball Coaches 2A Boys Player of the Year. Ninilchik head coach Nick Finley said he believes Colburn is among the best in Alaska at any level.

"This last spring and summer we went up and played against the 3A and 4A competition in the offseason, Yes he's the best in 2A, but I thin he's up there in the top five in the entire state," Finlev said.

The success is a product of the work, Finley said.

"It really shows how hard he works. He works in the offseason. He works in the weight room and he works during the season," Finley said. "Every chance he gets, the kid gives 110 percent. He pushes his teammates to be the best they can be. He's worked so hard."

Colburn averaged 18.5 points, 5 rebounds, 6 assists and 5.5 steals per game as a senior.

"Offensively he could go out and score 30 every single night at the 2A level, but he doesn't," Finley said. "All five starters averaged double figures throughout the entire season. It shows

how unselfish he is."




Finley said Colburn has really excelled on the defensive side also.

"He takes a lot of pride in his defense," Finley said. "He's really bought in, as all of our kids have, to playing defense and really getting our offense going from playing good defense. We create offense from forcing turnovers and forcing teams to play at a place they are not used to.

Finley said Colburn, a 5-foot-7 guard, was often tasked to defend bigger players. "It doesn't matter how big the kid is, Landon finds a way to shut them down," Finley said. Finley said Colburn has the aspiration and potential to play at the next level.

"We're doing everything we can do to get him recognized," Finley said.








Roger Steinbrecher Coaching Integrity Award

The Roger Steinbrecher Coaching Integrity Award is given to Chuck Boerger for demonstrating outstanding sportsmanship, leadership, camaraderie, and respect.



Chuck Boerger 2021 Roger Steinbrecher Coaching Integrity Award Recipient Chuck Boerger has spent his life involved in athletics - first as an athlete, competing in high school and college sports, and then as a coach. His coaching career spanned 36 years; 21 years were in Alaska.


His coaching career began at Lutheran High West in Detroit . He coached baseball and basketball from 1973-1978. From there he went to Adak, Alaska and coached basketball for three years. While there, he traveled with his teams and met many of the coaches who would later become good friends. From 1981-1991 he coached baseball and basketball at Concordia College in Ann Arbor, Michigan. In 1991 he returned to Alaska and coached in Seward for nine years, and then in Anchorage at Grace Christian for another nine years.

Chuck has always believed that the game is for the kids, so he considers the three times he took teams to State from Seward (placing 2nd in 92-93) and the three times he took teams to State from Grace (placing 2nd in 2013-2014), as well as being champions at the 07-08 Valdez Elks Tournament, to be some of his favorite memories. Equally important to him are the many former players that he has maintained contact with over the years.

Chuck has received a number of awards during his coaching career. He was named

Region 3 Coach of the Year four times while in Seward and three times while at Grace. He was also named Alaska 3A Coach of the Year in 2011-2012 and 2013-2014. In addition, he was inducted into Valparaiso University's Hall of Fame as a member of the nationally ranked 1968 baseball team, and also inducted into Concordia University's Hall of Fame in 2017 for his contributions to athletics. Roger was a greatly admired and respected coach, and Chuck is humbled and honored to receive the Roger Steinbrecher Award.

Chuck is now spending his retirement years, with his wife, Jane, in Florida (working on his golf) and in Minnesota (where five of his twelve grandchildren live), but Alaska will always be "home".



Molly Tuter, a standout, three sport athlete from Soldotna, graduated in 1993. Throughout high school, she led her basketball team to a 4A State Championship, was named Region III Player of the Year, was a First Team All-State MVP, and was the Alaska Gatorade Player of the Year.

Tuter went on to play basketball at Arizona State University where she won All Pac Ten Team honors twice and was third in career scoring with 1.374 points. She is also third in career steals and three-point field goals made. She was inducted into the ASU Sports Hall of Fame in 2011.



Her outstanding college career earned her an opportunity to play in the WNBA. Tuter has the distinction of being the first Alaskan female to play professionally. She played for the Phoenix Mercury.


Tuter then coached college basketball as an assistant at UCLA and became the head coach at UC Irvine for four years. She remembers her Alaskan roots and



makes her way back each summer to run the Molly Tuter Gym Rat Basketball Camp for the Kenai Peninsula Boys and Girls Club.

Jason Kaiser is one of Alaska's all time greats, he was a prolific scorer at all three levels and shined in some of the greatest moments in meaningful games.

Kaiser played high school basketball at Robert Service High School from 1987-1991. His senior year he was voted 4A player of the year by the Alaska Media.

Kaiser went on to play for Division I Weber State from 1991-1993 and

then came home to finish out his college career at UAA from 1993-1995. During that time, he won back to back Pac West Conference player of the year (94' & 95"). He was voted First Team All-American by Basketball Times in 1995. He became one of just two NCAA Division II players to play in the 1995 NABC All-Star Game, where he also won the three- point shooting contest.




As a UAA Junior he set a then-school record with 87 threepointers and lead the Seawolves to the PWC Title and an NCAA Tournament birth. As a senior he averaged 24.7 points, playing a school record 37.3 minutes a game and was voted UAA Athlete of The Year. His 23.5 point career scoring average is second all-time at UAA and he ranks sixth on Alaska's all-time college scoring list with 1,662 points.

Kaiser went on to play professional basketball in Australia's second division, which he lead in scoring with 35 points per

game. He is one of two Alaska men to score 50 points at the professional level.

One of Kaiser's greatest moments was when he led UAA to arguably it's greatest victory of all-time against Wake Forest and Tim Duncan at the 1993 Great Alaskan Shootout. Kaiser scored 35 points in the 70-68 win, and made all the right plays down the stretch in front of a national TV audience on ESPN.







Devon Bookert was the 4A State Player of the Year for Anchorage West High School in 2011 and 2012, averaging 25 points and 8 assists a game his senior

season, when he was named the Cook Inlet Conference Most Valuable Player. He then played in the Alaska Association of Basketball

Coaches Senior All-Star game and went on to be a deadly threepoint shooter at Florida State University, from 2012-16, leading the team with 59 3-pointers made his senior season. He finished with 1,120 points, 32nd in school history.





After college, Bookert went on to play the 2017-2018 season in the Czech Republic for the USK Praha. He finished the season 2nd in scoring on the team shooting 53% from the field and 85% from the free throw line. In 2019, Bookert joined the Austin Spurs in the NBA G League. After that season, he returned to Europe



to play, and played the 2022 season with CS Rapid Bucuresti where he averaged 14.7 points per game with an 88% free throw percentage.

Devon was Alaska's first two-time All-State Class 4A selection and led his Anchorage West team to a state championship his sophomore season, following in his dad, Kevin's footsteps, who played on the Anchorage West state championship team in 1988.

Success follows Kelsey Griffin everywhere she goes. Griffin's basketball career in high school, college and professional has been incredible. She currently plays in the WNBL (Australian Professional Basketball League) for the Canberra Capitals.

Griffin played high school basketball for Chugiak High School and helped her team win the 4A State Championship in 2003. She was a three time All Cook Inlet Player of the Year, 2003-2005. Griffin was selected to the 4A First Team All-state in 2005 and was named Alaska Gatorade Player of the Year.

Griffin was recruited by and played for the University of Nebraska. During her illustrious college career, she received many accolades: numerous tournament MVP awards, two-time Big 12 Rookie of the Week, nine-time Big 12 Player of the Week, Big 12 All-Rookie Team, Big 12 Freshman of the Year, and more.





In 2010, Griffin was the Big 12 Player of the Year, Naismith Award Finalist, Wooden Award Finalist, Wade Trophy Finalist, and Honda Sports Award Finalist. Griffin was also recognized for her academic achievements, including nine-time Big 12 Commissioners Academic Honor




Roll. For her incredible success, the University of Nebraska retired her number 23 jersey in 2014; she was inducted into the University of Nebraska Hall of Fame in 2021.



Griffin was the number three pick in the 2010 WNBA Draft (By Minnesota, traded to Connecticut) and that same year was named to the WNBA All-Rookie Team. She is a four-time WNBL Champion, 2013,2014, 2019, 2020. She was named the Grand Final MVP three times, 2013, 2014, 2019, and was named the WNBL MVP in 2019.





One could argue that Ruthy Hebard is one of the top power forwards to ever come out of the state of Alaska. She played high school basketball at West Valley High School and received back to back AABC Player of the year awards (2015 & 2016). She was the Alaska Gatorade player of the year three consecutive years (2014, 20015 & 2016). Her team was the state runner-up in 2015. She averaged 25.9 points, 15 rebounds, 3 steals, 2 blocks

her senior season. She scored 2,227 points in her high school career and is the first player in West Valley's history to have her jersey number retired. Hebard's athleticism earned her a NCAA Division I scholarship to the University of Oregon where she excelled.

Hebard's college career was nothing short of spectacular. She ended as the Oregon and Pac-12 all time leader in career field goal percentage (65.1%). She holds the NCAA record for consecutive field goals made (33).





Hebard is number 2 in Oregon history in points scored (2,368) and number 3 in Oregon history in rebounds (1,299), number 5 in double doubles (55) and one of only five Oregon players to surpass 2,000 career points and 1,000 career rebounds. Hebard won the Katrina McClain Award as the nations top power forward two consecutive seasons. She was a unanimous first




team all-American her senior year and helped her team win 3 Pac-12 titles.



As one would expect with such a stellar collegiate resume, Hebard was selected with the number 8 overall pick in the 2020 WNBA Draft. She is one of only 9 players to record a doubledouble for the Chicago Sky, her rookie season. Hebard already has a WNBA Championship ring with Chicago and has a very bright future in the WNBA.




Milo Griffin



Milo Griffin has been on the Alaska sports scene for 55 years, beginning with a record-setting basketball career from 1966-69 at the University of Alaska Fairbanks, where he is the number-two, all-time scorer.

He still holds the school record with

43 points in a game, the single season average (26.0 in 67-68), and free throws made (483) and attempted (575) in a career. His number 44 jersey has been retired by UAF, and he was inducted into the Nanooks Hall of Fame in 2008.






Griffin has taught more than 40 years at Fairbanks Lanthrop and West Valley High Schools, where he has coached track, cross country, tennis and basketball, including numerous state championships.





Milo Griffin was a finalist for the 2020 Joe Floyd Award, based on significant and lasting contributions to Alaska through sports.





Chuck White was unlike any basketball coach in Alaska history. He set the standard for winning during his 45 seasons at the high school level and broke records for wins (921), state titles (18) and conference championships (23).

White also left an indelible mark on the national stage, with his .802 winning percentage ranking top-10 all-time and his career wins ranking in the top-30.

He was a polarizing personality who seemed larger than life. Whether you loved him or hated him, White kept hoops relevant in Alaska. He was front-page news. His signature up-tempo style at both East High and West High in Anchorage ran opponents ragged and struck fear in opposing coaches.

His exciting brand of ball took the state by storm as his teams became a breeding ground for the college ranks. White produced household names Trajan Langdon, Muff Butler and Tony Reed – the holy trinity of T-bird basketball.

He helped Alaska hoops receive unprecedented exposure in the early 1990s with East becoming was the first Alaska team to be nationally ranked in 1993 and the first Alaska team to win the Great Alaska High School Classic in 1992.

He won his first state title in 1972 and his last state title in 2010. In between he posted twenty-nine 20-win seasons. Twice he won 28 games in a season. Only once did he have a losing season.


White had more than a dozen players win Alaska player-of-the-year honors, including Langdon, one of only three Alaskans to play in the NBA.

A 6-foot-4 man with broad shoulders and an easy smile, he came to Alaska in 1965 after an all-star career at the University of Idaho. He was drafted by the NBA (San Francisco Warriors), NFL (San Francisco 49ers) and MLB (Baltimore Orioles).

But he found his niche in coaching.

In 2010, White left Alaska for the college ranks. He took a job as an assistant coach at Adams State College in Colorado, where he reunited with his former East point guard, Louis Wilson, and coached until 2015. In 2019, he passed away at age 78, leaving behind a lasting legacy that extended beyond the basketball court. He impacted the lives of hundreds of young men and created a championship culture that raised Alaska hoops to an unprecedented level.

David K Porter grew up in Kingman, AZ and was a three-sport athlete for the Kingman Bulldogs. He played Division I basketball at the University of Idaho where he was a member of the 1993 Big Sky Championship team. He began his coaching career in West Jordan, UT, but returned to the University of Idaho when offered a coaching position as graduate assistant. After graduating with a master's degree in Education, he moved to Alaska. He coached at East High School, Service High School, Heritage Christian (with back-to-back state titles) and Houston High School. He received the Coach of the Year award for 3A in the Southcentral Conference and 4A in the Middle Alaska Conference.


Porter instilled core values on and off the court that his players carry with them throughout their lives. Anyone who has spent any time around Porter bears witness to this fact. He frequently sees his graduated players (and students) in the community. Not a visit ends without a humorous tale from Porter about the individual and not without a heartfelt anecdote of gratitude for all Porter did for them in high school.

His love for the game of basketball prompted him to establish a statewide basketball coaches association to promote the game, its players, and the coaches in Alaska. In 2009, he was elected as President of the Alaska Association of Basketball Coaches (AABC) and still holds the office.

Most notably, Porter introduced the AABC Senior All-Star games and has helped hundreds of athletes across the state receive college scholarships by inviting college coaches to recruit players at the games. To make the games possible, he has raised more than \$200,000 over the past 13 years. Porter formed national business partners to help coaches grow and to support the growth of basketball in the state.

Porter spearheaded and raised funds to honor all levels of the basketball community. The AABC gives coaches and officials gifts at the state tournament, began, and continues the statewide weekly coaches poll, oversees the All-State selection process, implemented, and hosts an awe-inspiring awards banquet, honors first-team All-State athletes with certificates and plaques, and created the hall of fame to honor coaches, graduated players, officials, and sportscasters.

On the national level, Porter is a founding member of the National High School Basketball Coaches Association (NHSBCA). Yearly, he attends meetings throughout the country to work with the NCAA, Officials, and college coaches, along with his peers from other states to promote the game, and most importantly to him, its players. His dedication to the game of basketball and to the athletes and coaches in Alaska will inspire others for years to come. When asked what motivates his generosity, he said, "I just want to give back to the game that has given me so much joy in life."





Already a member of the Alaska Association of Basketball Coaches Hall of Fame from her high school playing days in Fairbanks, Jeannie Hebert-Truax, the all-time winningest high school girls basketball coach in Alaska, 27 years and counting, now enters the coaching wing of the AABC.

After concluding a stellar career as a fouryear starter for the University of Miami, culminating as an All-American, Hebert-Truax became the varsity girls basketball coach at Wasilla High School in 1995 and continues up to the present, having won

six 4A state championships and three state coach of the year awards, while compiling a 553-193 career record.

In her high school playing days, Hebert-Truax won 3 state championships and was player of the year three times, but her coaching achievements match, if not exceed those honors. Starting in 2010-11, she coached Wasilla to three straight state titles, including a 30-0 mark in 2012-13. Her teams made 13 straight state appearances, won 16 regional championships, and she was Region III coach of the year ten times. The Warriors went undefeated in regionals six years in a row and made 13 straight state appearances. In 2017-18 she coached the McDonalds All-American-West team.

Hebert-Truax, referred to as "my right arm" by AABC president David Porter, was a co-founder of the organization, and has been a board member for 13 years. A class act at all times and a woman of integrity, she embodies what it is to be a coach and a mentor.



Milo Griffin



Milo Griffin is a coaching icon in the state of Alaska. When you think of Fairbanks and athletics you think of Coach Griffin. He is one of only two player/coach combos to be inducted into the Alaska Association of Basketball Hall of fame as both an ex-player and a coach. His legendary college career at UAA stands for itself but as a coach he has weathered the test of time. In an age where the average coach only coaches for 3 to 4 years, Griffin is nearing 50 years of coaching the game of Basketball and track and field.

He was the head boys' basketball coach

and head track coach at Lathrop High School from 1984-2014. During that time, he lead his track program to a state championship but an even more impressive feat, his basketball team made it to the state tournament 21 years in a row at the 4A classification.

From 2015-2022 he took over the head track position at West Valley High School, winning state 3 times. He couldn't stay away from coaching basketball long and took over the head girl's position at West Valley in 2016 to current.

Over the years the one thing that stands out is his relationship with his athletes. There isn't a time where you won't see Coach Griffin laughing and enjoying moments with his athletes. His love and dedication for the athletes he coaches is genuine and heartfelt.





Some might say taking his Bristol Bay boys basketball teams to the state tournament ten times in fourteen years and winning three championships would be grounds for electing Peter Bakun to the Alaska Coaches Hall of Fame, and they'd be right. But Coach Bakun considered having nearly every boys in the Angels' 66-75 student population out for the

basketball team his greatest accomplishment. After his first year in 1984, the program always had between 19 and 26 players participating.

In addition to three state titles, the Angels under Bakun finished second twice, third four times, and fourth once. Bakun was chosen ASAA Region Coach of the Year in 1988, 1992, and 1995 as well as the Alaska 2A Coach of the Year in 1988 and 1992.





Coach Rick Harris, of the Anderson High School Grizzlies, could have been elected to the Alaska Association of Basketball Coaches Hall of Fame twice in 2020 when he was inducted. First, as the head coach of the Lady Grizzlies from 1984 to 1994, which he led to three state championships, in 1985, 1986, and 1990, in four trips. At

the same time, he was coaching the boys team, which he continued to do until 2000, when he retired with a combined 453-267 win/loss record.

Coach Harris led the boys to the state 2A tournament eight times, including one championship appearance, and made seven trips with his girls' teams. Altogether, coach Harris' boys and girls teams combined to win nine regional titles. In addition, as if his head coaching accomplishments weren't enough, Harris coached both boys and girls junior varsity teams at the same time.



Jim Young



The Alaska Association of Basketball Coaches would like to welcome Jim Young to the 2021 AABC Hall of Fame class.

Over his 21 years of coaching, Young led his Lynx Lady Ballers to 17 State appearances and five 4A State Championships. During that span, he was named 4A State Coach of the Year three times, along with numerous Region Coach of the Year honors.

What really sets Young apart from his colleagues is his willingness to help athletes across the state succeed. He took many

athletes and teams out of state on recruiting trips and advocated for them with college coaches. He started the exposure camps for high school players and brought up college coaches to recruit.

Young's contributions to the Alaska Association of Basketball Coaches are great. Most notably, he created the largest recruiting event in the state by aligning his exposure camp with the AABC All-Star Games. He has served many vital roles and has been the Vice President for over six years.

Young is humble and gives praise to others. If you asked him today about his coaching career, he would say, I don't care about the wins as much as I care about preparing athletes for success in life.

I moved to Alaska during the summer of 1970 after teaching two years in Brookings, Oregon and eight years in Springfield, Oregon I was an Industrial Arts (Shop) teacher. I taught mainly Auto Mechanics and Welding, but also taught in a Jr. High in a General Shop where we taught Woodworking, Drafting, Electrical, Metal Working, Plastics, Mechanics and Metal Arts and Crafts. Having played any sports possible while in High School and attempting to play Football in College for two years, I also Coached Football and Track. During the first year of teaching in Brookings two fellow teachers asked if I might be interesting in Refereeing Basketball. While in College one of my part time jobs was helping run an intermural Basketball program for college students. One of the Phy. Ed. Profs. was the head of this program, but he pretty much had me in charge of almost everything. For each game, each team was supposed to supply a Referee. On many occasions one of these guys didn't show up so I ended up officiating many games for those two seasons. So I gladly accepted this challenge. In 1960 my teaching salary was a whooping \$4950.00 for the year so any extra money was very welcome. At this time, 1960, there was a JV and Varsity Boys game each contest. There were NO Girls sports back in that time. So being the Green Horn guy of the team I would work the JV game and each of the more experienced Refs. would each work a half with me and then they would Ref the Varsity game.

We worked with a group of Refs from Gold Beach and Port Orford and one or two Instructors from Coos Bay/North Bend would come and have a couple of teaching sessions and administer the HS Test. That first year is the very first time that I had ever looked at an actual Basketball Rules Book. If I had I been asked to take a Closed Book Test, Solo, I am sure that I would have FAILED it that

first year. However, the test was administered Open Book with everyone involved in open discussions. So all 12 or 14 guys ended up with the same Score. In the summer of 1962 I moved to Springfield, Ore. and joined the South Central BB Officials which had from 50 to 70 members. If you don't know your Ore. Geography, Springfield is right next door to Eugene so there is a big population to draw from. There were a few members who officiated different levels of College BB and they were a great help for myself and other younger officials to learn and advance quite rapidly. By the second season in the Lane County Assoc. I was working mainly a varsity schedule and also ended up working several Small College Games while I was in Oregon. A few years later I was voted as one of the officers of the Organization for three years. A highlight was Refereeing a High School game at McArther Court on the U of O campus prior to an Oregon - UCLA Game.

I joined the ABOA (Anchorage Basketball Officials Association) in 1970 and as for most newbies you had to prove yourself no matter what experience you may have previously had before you received a Varsity schedule. So the first year I worked mainly a schedule of JV games. But that was fun and I learned where all of the gyms were, met all of the coaches and learned to work with the players in the different levels of Adult Basketball in Anchorage. During the 1973-4 Season four of us were selected to work Tournament games in Palmer. This was a Small School Tournament and Chugiak, Eielson, Kodiak and Palmer were the contestants and Wayne Anderson, Buddy Bise, Jerry Kerr and myself were the officials. A great experience and loads of fun.

During my time with ABOA I served as VP charged with Training and Evaluation for 4 years and as President from 1977 to 1988, then Assigner form 1988 to 1994. In the late 80's and early 90's there were about 110 to 120 Officials and 25 or so Timers/Scorers. Officials were assigned to games from Homer and Kodiak to the South and North to Glennallen and Talkeetna and to the East to Valdez and Cordova. And during Regional Tournaments to many of the Schools and Regions in the Greater part of Alaska to the West. Girls sports finally became a regular event and each of the Anchorage schools had a C, JV and Varsity team for both Girls and Boys, plus all of the youth and Adult games the Assigning could get very hectic. In 1994 (I think) ABOA became ASOA (Anchorage Sports Officials Assoc.). Officials Originations had to follow Tax Regulations of the time.

When UAA started a Men's BB program I Officiated several of their games and also for Alaska Pacific. In those early years, UAA didn't have a gym so they played games in any available gym and I remember officiating games at Bartlett, Wendler, West and Ft. Rich. At Alaska Pacific I officiated a game where to Great Elgin Baylor was the Coach of the visiting team.

During the 1970's and 80's I would usually Officiate close to 200 ball games a season. The seasons usually started in late Sept. with Jr. High, Youth games and various Adult level leagues. And these games continued into May in the Spring.

All of my early Officiating was done with the 2 man system. In the 1980's three officials teams were being used and ABOA started using this system. To begin with Most of the Pay for that 3rd official came from ABOA as the Anchorage Schools didn't want to pay for that extra official. At some point the schools decided it didn't want the 3rd official and it was dropped for a year of so. But then it returned and is the norm for almost any level of basketball today.

Many people have asked over the years how do you put up with the nasty people in the crowds and sometimes coaches. To be honest when you are out on the court you generally tune out most of that crowd noise because you are concentrating so much on the game. And in many cases the fans are not up to date with the rules of the game so many of their comments are totally comical. In my case I truly believe that because I officiated BB I kept my body in much better condition than most people my age. Each fall I would ride bicycle 10 to 15 miles several times a week and go hiking in the mountains on other days. In the winter on days that I wasn't officiating I would go Cross Country skiing for a few hours. And now that I am in my 80's I still go the the gym and go hiking to keep from becoming a FAT OLD COUCH POTATO.





Dick Shellhorn, of Cordova, has refereed basketball for over 50 years. His "official" career as a certified official began in 1972 at the age of 28, at the urging of friend and fellow basketball fanatic, (and sole local referee at the time), Jerry Bendzak. At that time, Shellhorn was the JV basketball coach for the Cordova Wolverines, so as soon as he'd finished coaching the JV games, he would need to quickly change into his officiating uniform to ref for the Varsity games. Shellhorn has officiated from places as far flung as Korea while serving there in the Army, to all over Alaska, from Barrow to Petersburg, Dutch Harbor to Tok, and Valdez to Cordova.

Shellhorn has never stopped striving to improve his officiating, always open to advice from other referees and always reading


about latest developments. He's been instrumental in keeping the Cordova Referee Association alive by recruiting and encouraging new referees, many of whom are former students and players.

One of Shellhorn's career highlights was being paired up with Jerry Bendzak to referee a state tournament game at Sullivan Arena in 2006. After 34 years of reffing together, it was a dream come true; one of his mentors later related that it had been "...a game officiated with that perfect combination of respect for the game and true enjoyment of it." It was an experience that exemplified one of his favorite aspects of officiating: the camaraderie between officials. For Dick Shellhorn, refereeing and sports are a chance to learn and teach lessons and to overcome adversity. They bring out the best in us...and remind us to laugh.





Mike Lyle



Mike Lyle was born in Hawthorne, Nevada on April 11, 1946. He arrived in Anchorage, Alaska in January 1969. From 1971-2001 he worked for the Department of the Army at Ft. Richardson. He played recreational league basketball during that time until 1984, when he decided that he wanted to try basketball officiating. He felt that it would benefit him physically and he could still be a part of the game he enjoyed. Mike contacted Don Kassube, a member of the Anchorage Basketball Officials Association, who was instrumental in getting Mike started in officiating.

Training as an official was limited in the early 80s. Mike started officiating the YMCA recreational league and was evaluated by the officials he ran the court with. Back in those days, it was 2-crew officiating. Mike improved rapidly while learning about the "Art of Officiating" basketball, which includes rehearsing fundamental judgments, deescalating situations, pre-game discussions, and

facing unexpected challenges. He worked several games with great reviews and was feeling confident and proud. Then, he worked a game with Greg McGee who brought Mike's ego down to earth! Without holding back comment, Greg taught Mike that there was much more to officiating than just calling fouls and violations in the rule book. He needed to learn the art of verbal judo and conflict resolution. Fortunately, Mike was gifted with a tremendous smile and magical wit and improved dramatically.

In 1986, Mike went on his first officiating road trip to Nome and Emmonak with Whip Whaley. Through the game of basketball, Mike has officiated across Alaska including Fairbanks, Matanuska Susitna School District, Glennallen, Valdez, Cordova, Whittier, Kenai Peninsula, Anchorage, Kodiak, Dillingham, Bristol Bay, Sand Point, Bethel, Kuskokwim villages, Yukon River villages. Without question, these travel games have been one of the best experiences in Mike's officiating career. He still maintains friendships with many of the locals in these towns and villages in Alaska

with many of the locals in these towns and villages in Alaska. In 1988, Mike was elected to the board of director of the Anchora ge Basketball Officials Association. He served on that board for 17 years. Officiating milestones include Alaska Regional Basketball Tournament Selections from 1989-2005 and Alaska State Basketball Tournament Selections in 1989 & 1992(1A), 1994 & 1996(2A), 1997(3A) and 1998(4A). Mike holds the rare distinction of working in the Alaska State Basketball Tournaments as a floor official, assignor, and evaluator, and now a fan.

In 2005, Mike was voted in as the assignor for the Anchorage Sports Officials Association. To help grow the officiating members, Mike helped create the Valley Basketball Officials Association as well as providing statewide clinics. He officially retired from officiating in 2010 and was considered one of the best officials in the state. He was always prepared, professional, and treated athletes respectfully.

Mike and his wife Lyn reside in Anchorage and enjoy golfing, fishing, and traveling to Arizona to visit grandkids, and to Nevada to see family.







Dave Leval has always had a passion to cover sports. He spent several years as the play-by-play man for high school football in NW Florida, and in indoor football. Dave served as the emergency fill-in sports anchor at several stations he worked. But, he had to come to Alaska for his first full-time sports job at KTVA from February 2015-August 2018 when the Sports Department closed.

During that time he produced many sports stories about Alaska, including basketball from youth, high school, college, and the NBA.

Dave said Alaska is not considered a hot bed for college recruiters. But it does produce its share of athletes who move on after high school. It's so important to tell their stories

to help inspire younger children they can also be successful.

"Alaska has so many amazing basketball stories to tell. That's the trick to covering the sport, not just showing highlights of a game."

Dave said he is beyond grateful to join the ranks of those enshrined in the Alaska Association of Basketball Coaches Hall of Fame, and promises to do his part to promote the sport around the state as much as he can.

Dave is now at Alaska's News Source where he continues to tell stories about Alaska, and hopes to report on more sports news impacting the state, including basketball.



Officials, sportswriters, and broadcasters added to the AABC Hall of Fame for the first time

The Alaska Association of Basketball Coaches has chosen to expand the AABC Hall of Fame to include sportswriters, broadcasters, and officials because of the parallels to the secret of success on the court, according to President David Porter, "All these different entities working together as a cohesive unit make the game what it is." And so, in 2020, broadcaster Dave Leval was chosen as the initial member of the expanded group, but the pandemic prevented celebrating the occasion. At this year's event, inductees from 2020 and 2021 will be honored along with the class of 2022.



Jeremiah Bartz has covered sports in Alaska for more than 25 years. Bartz has spent the last 20 years with the Mat-Su Valley Frontiersman, as the sports editor for about 16 years and now the managing editor. During his time with the Valley newspaper, Bartz has earned numerous Alaska Prep Club Awards, including best sports columnist and the Suzan Nightingale Award for the best overall columnist in Alaska. He had the opportunity to cover at least one Mat-Su team in a 4A state basketball championship game in 13 seasons from 2002 to 2018.

Bartz has also broadcasted hundreds of prep

basketball games on radio stations throughout the state and the NFHS network. The list includes several state basketball title games and the first Alaska Basketball Coaches Association All-Star Game.

Bartz was also the host of the Valley Sports Huddle radio show for more than a decade.

For the past several years, Bartz has worked with the AABC overseeing the selection of the all-state basketball teams, and has written features about dozens of Alaska basketball players from across the state.

Prior to his time at the Frontiersman, Bartz studied journalism and marketing at UAF and worked in the athletic department. During his time with UAF athletics, Bartz spent time as the sports information director for sports including men's and women's basketball.

Bartz graduated from Palmer High School in 1995. He and his wife, Amber, reside in Palmer, and are the proud parents of daughters Abigayle, 13, and Alyson, 16, who passed away in late 2021.







For more than 40 years, Van Williams has been writing about and promoting Alaska sports, publishing more than 10,000 stories, approximately half on basketball.

His work has been featured in more than a dozen newspapers in Alaska and on ESPN. com. He has covered 75 Great Alaska Shootout games and more than 150 at ASAA's March Madness.

Williams was instrumental in restoring the all-

state voting to coaches from the media and created Alaska's top-100, all-time college scoring list for both men and women.

An Alaska Press Club winner, Williams created a 64-man bracket to determine Alaska's Greatest NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Player in 2020 and researched and wrote the story about Mike Dunlap being first Alaskan to play in NCAA Tournament in 1980 and every Alaskan that has played since.

He began covering sports in 1991, at the age of 19, for the Anchorage Times, moving to the Anchorage Daily News, where he was the UAA men's basketball beat reporter from 2001-2008, serving as sports editor in his final year.

From 2009-2021 he operated the Alaska Sports Blog, creating the Alaska Sports Report in 2021.

He has been Alaska Airlines Classic media director since 2013 and responsible for recruiting teams since 2018.



Bethany Carstens University of Nevada 2019 AABC All-Star

Bethany Carstens began her basketball college career at Chicago State University where she played in 27 games as a freshman. With 17 starts as a rookie, Carstens averaged 12.3 points per game(2nd on the team), made 38.8% of her shots from the field, and boasted 79.2% from the free throw line. In 2020, Carstens transferred through a blanket NCAA waiver and was able to play 15 games, including 1 start for the 2020-2021 season at the University of Nevada. In her sophomore year she earned her letter with the Wolfpack.

Tobin Karlberg University of Alaska Anchorage 2018 AABC All-Star

As a frehman, Tobin Karlberg played in all 28 games, which included three double-digit perfomances. During Karlberg's sophomore season, he earned honorable mention All-GNAC accolades including double figures in 23 games, ranking him 2nd in the GNAC in 3FG%, among other top 10 catergorical rankings. Karlberg, in his Junior season, 2021-2022, scored a total of 438 points in 24 games, which is an average of 18.3 points per game. Additionally, he shot 45% from the field and 83.6% at the free throw line. In Karlberg's final game of the 2021-2022 season vs. University of Alaska Fairbanks, he finished the game with season highs in points(28) and field goals made(9).





Alissa Pili University of Southern California 2019 AABC All-Star

Alissa Pili started 30 of 31 games during her freshman year and earned All-Pac-12 Team, Pac-12-All-Freshman Team, four-time Pac-12 Freshman of the Week and Pac-12 Freshman of the Year accolades. By season's end, Pili was ranked in the nation's top-100 in 5 statistical categories-final points(504), field-goal percentage(51.1%), double-doubles(11), free throws made(109) and field goals made(190). During Pili's sophomore season she average 11 points, 3.8 rebounds, 1.1 steals, 1.0 assists per game, shooting 41.5 percent from the floor. In 2021-2022, Pili continued her career as a solid forward for the Trojans.







The results are an outstanding senior season. She enters the state tournament with 416 points, 225 rebounds and 115 assists, and averaged 18 points per game. Lexi Seymore now has more than 1,200 points and 800 rebounds, both school records, in her four-year varsity career with the Huskies.

Seymore can play everywhere on the floor for the 2022 3A Easton Conference runner-up.





"If we can get a mismatch, I put her inside as a post. But most of the time, she brings up the ball and plays point guard," Dawn Seymore said.

Dawn Seymore also said Lexi's personality has also stood out to those they play with and against. "Every single coach has come up to me and said her smile on the court is so contagious to both sides of the court," Dawn Seymore said.

Dawn Seymore is not just Lexi's high school coach, she's also her mom. Lexi's twin brother Logan is also a standout at Redington, and was named third-team all-state for the 3A boys by the AABC, The younger siblings in the family also play. The Seymores are a big basketball family.

"It's just something when they were little, we were always able to spend time in the gym as a family," Dawn Seymore said.

The 6-foot-2 junior averaged 15 points per game. Boerger said with the different role, Lentfer has expanded his game.

"He's always been a post player, but he's really coming on as an outside threat and outside shooter," Boerger said. "Overall, he's just really kind of the motor that runs this team."

Leader of the Pack: West Valley junior sweeps Alaska basketball top honors

Stewart Erhart made West Valley school history earlier this month, becoming the first Wolfpack boys basketball player to be named the Alaska Gatorade Player of the Year. Now the West Valley junior has another honor. Erhart has been named the Wasilla Physical Therapy/Alaska Association of Basketball Coaches 4A Boys Player of the Year.

West Valley head coach Colten Growden said Erhart is the motor that powers the Wolfpack.

"Hard worker, very strong competitor. He doesn't give up and plays every second, to every whistle, dives on the floor, saves the ball, jumps in the stands, takes charges," Growden said. "He's a pretty special player."

Erhart is a leader of a West Valley program that has only lost four games in the last three years.

"He's kind of the face of our team right now, and it's not so much just because of his skills, but his work ethic," Growden said. "He's a worker. Everything you ask him to do, he gives 100 percent. He's a kid that lives and breathes basketball, and is an absolute gym rat."

But you can't forget about the skills of Erhart, a 6-foot-2 point guard.

"Very, very skilled with the basketball. You can't take it away from him," Growden said. "He's also tremendous rebounder and shooter."

Erhart currently leads the Wolfpack in every major statistical category. The second-year starter is averaging 16.1 points, 6 rebounds, 4 steals and 2.5 assists per game.

Growden and the Wolfpack have the luxury of another year with Alaska's top player. And Erhart has a future beyond that, Growden said.

"He will easily be a college basketball player," Growden said. "What level depends on what level he can defend at. I personally think he's a high-level defender. I think he should be able to play Division II basketball, if not lower end Division I if other coaches think he can defend at that level."
